



SEC. 68.1. PURPOSES


The Cultural Equity Endowment Fund is established to move San Francisco arts funding toward cultural equity.

Priority funding goes to organizations that foster artistic expression deeply rooted in and reflective of historically marginalized communities. These communities include: African and African American; Latinx; Asian and Asian American; Arab; Native American; Pacific Islander; lesbian, gay, bisexual, queer; transgender and gender variant people; people with disabilities; and women.

ELIGIBILITY AND REQUIREMENTS

SAN FRANCISCO ARTISTS

Supports artistic commissions that stimulate the creation and presentation of creative works of art presented throughout the city's neighborhoods.

- The artist must live in SF (for past two years), be at least 18 years old, and cannot be enrolled as a full-time student
- Up to \$20,000 to San Francisco-based artists creating work
- All genres; eighteen-month grant window; five (5) years or less experience reviewed by a separate panel.
- Public benefit accessible to an SF audience.



ELIGIBILITY

- Two-year demonstrated history of operating/living in San Francisco
- Must have provided a public benefit to a San Francisco based audience in the last two years
- Artists can apply for themselves or with a fiscal sponsor
 - Organizations cannot act as fiscal sponsors for employees or contractors, a third party fiscal sponsor is required
 - City & County of San Francisco or the San Francisco Unified School District employees MUST apply with a fiscal sponsor
- Must be in good standing with other grants and loans
- Project activities must take place in S.F. between July 1, 2022 and December 31. 2023.
- Project must include a public benefit accessible by a San Francisco based audience that fits the project.



APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS


- No budget required
- Proof of current San Francisco address (a bill or other document establishing you at that address in the last 3 months)
- Fiscal Sponsor letter, if applicable
- CV/Resume (2 pages max)
- Work Samples: up to five (5) links or appropriately sized files to upload
- Work Sample Webinar: October 13 at 4 p.m.



SEC. 68.5. COMMISSIONS TO INDIVIDUAL ARTISTS.









The Commissions to Individual Artists Program shall provide support to individual artists to stimulate production and dissemination of works of art in all disciplines and all neighborhoods of San Francisco. The majority of Commissions to Individual Artists in any year shall be to artists who are deeply rooted in and able to express the experiences of historically underserved communities such as African American; Asian American; disabled; Latino; lesbian and gay; Native American; Pacific Islander; and, women.

SCORING CRITERIA: WORK SAMPLES

Question	Points	Criteria
Work Samples: Upload samples of your past work. The samples should show your ability to complete your proposed project, as well as demonstrate knowledge of and experience in your creative practice. Any combination of the following: 5 images, 5 pages, 5 minutes of audio/video	20	Work samples show an ability to complete the proposed project, as well as demonstrate knowledge of and experience in the artist's creative practice.



Question	Points	Criteria
Describe the ideas and processes involved in making your project and your role in the creative process. It is important to give the panelists a clear picture of what you are doing and how you are doing it. 500 word limit	20	Artist clearly describes the ideas and processes involved in making the project and their role in the creative process.
If you are working with other partners or collaborators, please outline their role in the project. 250 word limit		If applicable: Roles of any partners or collaborators are outlined.

Question	Points	Criteria
How will your project provide a public benefit to San Francisco, its neighborhoods and/or communities and why is it appropriate for your project? How will you know the public benefit achieved your intended purpose (goals)? 250 word limit	10	Applicant describes the public benefit. Applicant's explanation of why the public benefit is appropriate for the project makes sense. Applicant sets goals for a successful public benefit.



Question	Points	Criteria
Why is this project important to you and to the future of your artistic practice? 350 word limit	15	Applicant articulates why the project is important to them and to the future of their artistic practice.



Question	Points	Criteria
Completed grant plan with distinct activities, outputs and date completed by. 90 word limit	5	Artist translates their project description and plan into distinct activities during the grant window.




GRANTSEEKER TIPS



- Read the guidelines thoroughly and refer to the instructions.
- Schedule a 15 minute session with Program Officer Anne Trickey, 415-806-5884, anne.trickey@sfgov.org.
- Gather work samples, review file size and test links in advance.
- Draft responses in another document, then cut and paste answers into the online form.
 Pay attention to word count.
- Write with enthusiasm and tell a compelling story.
- Be consistent, be specific, consider having a friend review before submitting.
- DEADLINE November 10, 2020, 12 p.m. (noon)

PANEL PROCESS



- To ensure our process is rooted in racial equity, applications are openly reviewed by a panel of peers. Our panelists:
 - Meet in a virtual publicly accessible setting
 - Review applications, discuss and score applications
- Staff work hard to create panels are equitably representative of the applicant pool and the larger city of San Francisco with regards to race/ethnicity, gender identity, sexuality, ability status, as well as artistic discipline and organizational expertise.
