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San Francisco is home to a remarkable Civic Art Collection. Comprised of over 4,000 objects worth in excess of \$93 million, the Collection includes such treasures as the Coit Tower murals, sculptures by Beniamino Bufano, Lotta's Fountain and hundreds of contemporary artworks commissioned through the City's Public Art Program, Due to the City's budget challenges, this one-of-a-kind collection has been historically underfunded. Beautification

SFAC's Civic Design Review ensures excellence of the built environment through a threephase review of structures and parks on City land by SFAC staff and commissioners. The committee carefully reviewed the plans for the new Palega Playground and Clubhouse to guarantee that it meets the highest level of design while fulfilling multiple needs of the community. Two public art projects, an interior mosaic mural by Kelly Ording and an outdoor kinetic sculpture by the artist team Rebar Group, are also underway and will be unveiled at the park's opening in fall 2012.

The following grants were provided by the SFAC's Cultural Equity Grants Program, which awards projectbased and organizational grants to San Francisco arts organizations and individual artists. The artists, organizations and/or projects listed are either based in or performed in District Nine.

Dance Brigade (dancemission.org) received an \$18,000 capital improvement grant for restroom upgrades and sound proofing.

Precita Eyes Muralists Association (precitaeyes.org) was awarded \$17,111 for capital improvements to improve the health and safety of their building.

With a \$7,700 grant, dancer/choreographer **Deborah Slater** (deborahslater.org) will develop a piece exploring the duality of being both an artist and soldier, to be performed at Theater Artaud in fall 2013.

CubaCaribe (cubacaribe.org) was granted \$11,850 for its ninth annual festival at ODC Theater in spring 2013.

Voice of Witness (voiceofwitness.org) was awarded two grants: \$25,000 will support the development of "Patriot Acts: Narratives of post-9/11 Injustice", and \$11,850 for a digital media podcast featuring recordings of dramatic readings and interviews with the editors of the organization's book series.

An \$11,850 grant will support the **Center for the Art of Translation**'s (catranslation.org) Two Voices, a reading series spotlighting international writers and translators presenting literature from around the world in a variety of media including video and podcasts.

Litquake (litquake.org) received \$11,850 for monthly programming and its nine-day literary festival, October 5-13, 2012.

With an \$11,850 grant, **ABADA Capoeira San Francisco** (abada.org) will commemorate its 20th anniversary by presenting the "Spirit of Brazil Festival", featuring dance performances, guest Brazilian and local artists, workshops, lectures, and art exhibits. Galeria de la Raza (galeriadelaraza.org) received two grants: \$12,825 for capacity building for emerging Native American and indigenous artists; and \$25,000 to increase the Artistic Program Manager's time, and for five Latino arts groups'/ artists' professional development in planning, financing, and implementing projects that express the experiences of San Francisco's Latino residents.

With a 1,000 grant, the **Instituto Familiar de la Raza** (ifrsf.org) will present Dia De Los Muertos programs including danza, a community altar, songs and prayers, and art workshops.

Local legend Guillermo Gómez-Peña

(pochanostra.com) was awarded \$10,000 for the creation and development of "2012: The Return of Border Brujo", a solo performance piece that deconstructs the violence confronting Latinos living on the border and explores its psychological, cultural, and economic consequences.

A \$7,315 grant will support **Leticia Hernandez** in creating and presenting "Mortaja", a series of interdisciplinary performances addressing the historical Central American figure, Prudencia Ayala.

The **Museum of Craft and Folk Art** (mocfa.org) will present *Florenzca* (Flourish), the first solo exhibition of artwork by Mexican-American artist Margarita Cabrera from November 2012 to February 2013, with a \$11,850 grant.

Where Art Meets Education

Art Impact provides a platform to explore and discuss the impact of arts education through the lens of high profile individuals. In August 2011, the SFAC hosted an intimate talk with local music legend **Pete Escovedo** (pictured right) at the Mission Cultural Center for Latino Arts. Escovedo spoke about his experiences in the music world as well as his other little known talent, painting.

WritersCorps, the SFAC's award-winning program that places professional writers in community settings to teach creative writing to youth, served 75 students at Hilltop School.
